From the Bimah

Rabbi Dr. Janet B Liss

Driving to Hickory from Charlotte on Friday, we encountered a thick fog that obscured everything ahead. It felt appropriate to the uncertainty of what lies ahead of us. I am sure none of us would have foreseen the events that have unfolded in the United States, since the New Year began. To quote our liturgy, "when pain and loss assail us, we look to the Creator of life for strength and courage."

In this new secular year, we are going to be challenged. Questions will arise that test us and make us question who we are, where we are going, what is acceptable, what are American values, how do we balance differing beliefs, how do we engage in civil discourse?

Judaism teaches us values. Our Bible and sacred writings teach us how to behave, how to be respectable, honor to honor ourselves, the strangers in our midst, our neighbors and God. We are taught in Leviticus in the Holiness Code that we read on Yom Kippur, for example, "Do not Stand idly by as your neighbor bleeds." The Torah tells us 36 times to treat the stranger well for we were strangers in the Land of Egypt. We are taught in both sets of the Ten Commandments not to lie or bear false witness. If these beliefs which are ours and also the basis for Christian belief were actually put into practice, we would have a much more tolerant and fair society.

I have watched the video of Renee Nicole Good being shot over and over again in the last few days. The fact that a US citizen could be gunned down in broad daylight by an ICE agent is beyond frightening to me. No matter what one's political beliefs, the videos taken from many angles show the truth of what happened. She was

murdered while trying to drive away. Lying will never be accepted as the new norm.

When I need strength, I turn to God and to people who share my outrage and beliefs. I hope during these coming months when we are fortunate to come together that we will find comfort and solace by being with each other in community.

The Harriet Sederholm Scholarship Fund

The Harriet Sederholm Scholarship Fund (HSSF) was established by a long-time Temple member and past President, Burt Sederholm (may his memory be a blessing), to honor his late wife Harriet, who died shortly after she

retired from 25 years with the Catawba County Department of Social Services. The scholarship committee is a sub-committee of the Temple Beth Shalom Board. The committee manages funds invested to award one-time scholarships with the earnings from the invested funds. These awards honor the memory of Harriet Sederholm and her efforts to improve the lives of many impoverished adults and children in Catawba County.

The HSSF scholarship is available to students. Candidates will submit an essay to any one of the committee members. The essay will explain who the candidate is, what they are doing currently, their plans for the future, how the scholarship funds will be used, and, if applicable, what the connection may be to Jewish life.

The committee will make decisions based on the following preferences but not absolutes:

- Is the applicant a temple member or related to a temple member?
- Is the applicant Jewish?
- Will the funds be used for educational needs?

- Will the funds make a difference regarding the applicant's ability to benefit from the activity?
- Is the activity something deemed to be of value by the committee?

Interested students should submit their essays by April 30th. The scholarship season runs from May 1-April 30. All applicants will be notified in writing if their application has been approved or declined by May 15th. Awards should be mailed to recipients by May 31st.

The essay should be emailed to any of the committee members: Lin Gentry or Karen Ferguson. Naturally, the committee encourages everyone to make a tax-deductible donation to the Scholarship Fund at any time.
