From the Bimah: Our Rabbi's Message

On Tuesday, June 11, at sundown, the Festival of Shavuot begins. Shavuot comes 49 days after the beginning of Passover and is one of the three pilgrim festivals. Shavuot is both a harvest holiday and it's when we celebrate receiving the Torah at Mt. Sinai. Traditionally we stand as a congregation as the 10 Commandments are read,

re-enacting the moment that took place thousands of years ago.

The 10 Commandments are 10 of 613. They are so important that they appear twice in the Torah. On numerous occasions, I have done this exercise with different groups of people. So imagine for a moment that we are doing this now. If we were to write 10 Commandments today for our society, what would we want them to include? I would begin with, 1) Treat everyone with kindness as we are all created in the image of God. 2) stop idolizing people and material objects. 3) foster peace between your family, your community, your country and the world. 4) Truly observe Shabbat, study your religion and be eager to perform mitzvot. 5) Do not steal anything; intellectual property, material possessions, another's dignity, someone else's person, or anything that isn't yours. 6) Be truthful, do not lie or take advantage

of vulnerable people. 7) Do not oppress the stranger, remember that your family came from some place else too, welcome the stranger, help the stranger in your midst. 8) work every day to make a difference in this world. 9) Never hurt another human being, guard your speech and your actions. 10) work hard to be happy and enjoy every minute of your lives.

Imagine how much better the world would be if everyone followed the original 10 Commandments! On Shavuot it is customary to only eat dairy products as it was forbidden to eat meat when the Israelites received Torah. This was also one of the three times a year when all Jewish males were required to go to the Temple in Jerusalem and bring their firstborn of both the flocks and children if they were male for redemption at the Temple, as well as the first fruits of the harvest season. So, while we no longer make this pilgrimage to Jerusalem, we still go to synagogue, we still eat dairy and hopefully, we can still enjoy the fruits of our labor whatever they may be.

We will be having Shabbat Services on June 14th and 15th and I hope you will join us then. I wish you all a Chag Sameach, a Happy Holiday, and look forward to our first summer services together.

His topic in preparation for *Shavuot* was "What is the Torah?" Turns out there were lots of answers! My takeaway: Law based in narrative = healthy Judaism. Let's ask Rabbi Liss to tell us more!

We're all looking forward to our next weekend with Rabbi Liss on Friday night, June 14, at 7:00 and Saturday morning, June 15, at 10:00, followed by kiddush lunch. For this month only, we'll forego adult Jewish learning, potluck dinner, and Havdalah. Stay tuned for what's coming up.

And the war between Israel and Hamas rages on -- almost eight months after the initial brutal attack on October 7, 2023. We cannot forget that there still are innocent hostages being held by Hamas -- unsure of the count as I understand more deaths have been discovered in recent days, and that Jews around the world continue to grieve for the atrocities that were inflicted on October 7. And we continue to fight back against

the frightening degree of Antisemitism that has ensued -- especially those that are taking place on college campuses across the US. Until all hostages are free and the savage war we did not invite is over, I'll continue to repeat information as to sites we can visit to help our Israeli brothers and sisters.

The Harriet Sederholm Scholarship Fund (HSSF) was established by a long-time Temple member and past President, Burt Sederholm (may his memory be a blessing), to honor his late wife Harriet, who died shortly after she retired from 25 years with the Catawba County Department of Social Services. The scholarship committee is a sub-committee of the Temple Beth Shalom Board. The committee manages funds invested to award one-time scholarships with the earnings from the invested funds. These awards honor the memory of Harriet Sederholm and her efforts to improve the lives of many impoverished adults and children in Catawba County.

The HSSF scholarship is available to students. Candidates will submit an essay to any one of the committee members. The essay will explain who the candidate is, what they are doing currently, their plans for the future, how the scholarship funds will be used, and, if applicable, what the connection may be to Jewish life.

The committee will make decisions based on the following preferences but not absolutes:

- Is the applicant a temple member or related to a temple member?
- Is the applicant Jewish?
- Will the funds be used for educational needs?
- Will the funds make a difference regarding the applicant's ability to benefit from the activity?
- Is the activity something deemed to be of value by the committee?

Interested students should submit their essays by April 30th. The scholarship season runs from May 1-April 30. All applicants will be notified in writing if their application has been approved or declined by May 15th. Awards should be mailed to recipients by May 31st.

The essay should be emailed to any of the committee members: Lin Gentry, Karen Ferguson, or Sandy Guttler. Naturally, the committee encourages everyone to make a tax-deductible donation to the Scholarship Fund at any time.
